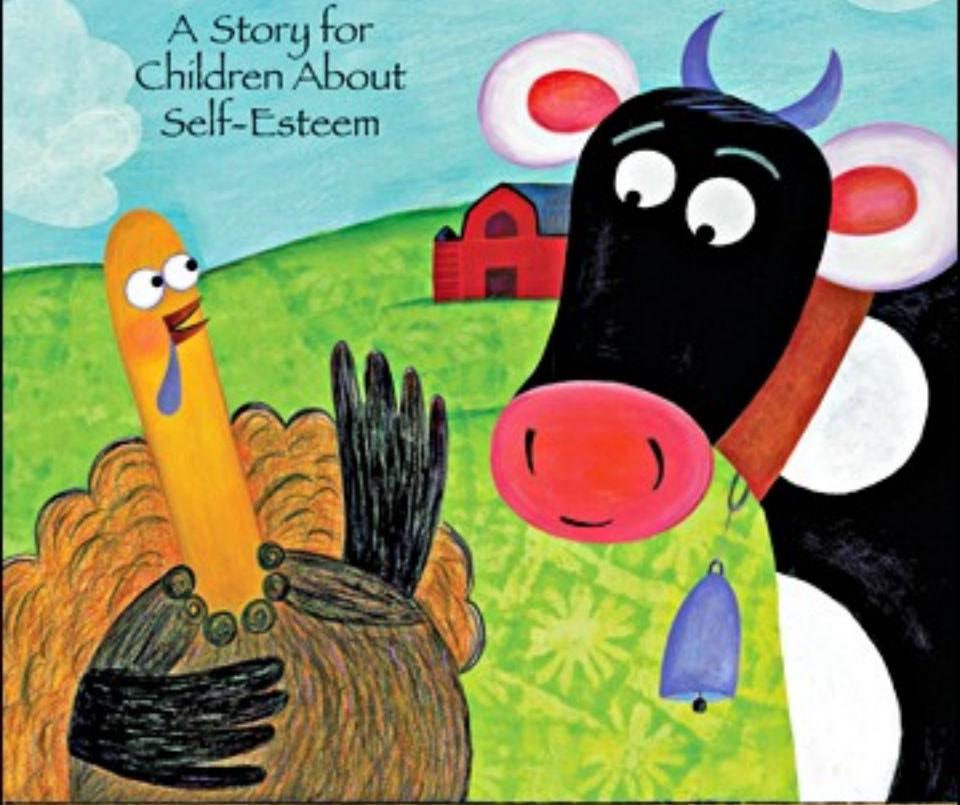


I Want Your Moo
